- VCDPE contracted with the VDH Chronic Disease Unit in 2016
- Tasked to conduct formal assessment of status of diabetes prevention programs in Virginia and develop Strategic Plan

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Formative Research

- Completed 47 interviews with key stakeholder groups from March-June 2016
 - National programs and agencies with DPPs
 - 1422 grant-funded health districts
 - DPP CDC-pending recognition sites in Virginia
 - DPP increased capacity funding from VDH
 - Persons with Prediabetes
 - Health Care Systems
 - Health Care Organizations
 - Health Plans or Payers
 - Large Employers

Growth of CDC-Pending Recognition Sites in Virginia

- Increase 8 to 16 sites since January 2016
 - 4 Free Clinics
 - 3 Health Systems
 - 2 YMCA's
 - 2 Health District-related
 - 1 FQHC
 - 1 Employer-based
 - 1 Virginia Cooperative Extension
 - 1 Native American Non-Profit
 - 1 Black Women's Health Imperative

National Stakeholders

- Relationships and communication!
- Involvement of legislators
- State champion(s)
- Create, utilize partnerships
- National model of coverage by state employee health plans
- State diabetes advisory council



Virginia 1422-Funded Health Districts

- Variation in implementation of DPP, use of funding, timelines, partnerships
- Partnerships created with YMCA's, Cooperative Extension, Area Agencies on Aging (AAA)
- Need for statewide leadership and coordination



CDC-Pending Recognition Sites in Virginia

- YMCA Virginia State Alliance successful in spread of DPPs in Virginia
- Bon Secours was first health system to implement DPP, receive CDC-pending recognition, and reimburse through selfinsured health plan
- Free Clinics are a good community model for DPP implementation



DPP Increased Capacity Funding from VDH

- Diabetes self-management education (DSME) program staff not familiar with CDC's NDPP and DPRP; focus on DSME recognition
- Explore partnerships between hospital/community-based programs
- Large employers with self-insured health plans provide a good opportunity for DPP implementation



Persons with Prediabetes

- Not referred by their health care provider; found programs on their own
- Enrolled in a variety of programs employer-based, online, YMCA
- Participants struggled with DPP structure time commitment and program requirements (attendance, tracking, physical activity, weight loss)



Virginia Health Care Systems

- DSMES programs serving people with prediabetes within program or as separate information sessions
- Need greater familiarity on CDC-DPRP process, elements of DPP research, translational evidence
- Need greater familiarity with AADE's CDC grant, findings and programs
- Obtaining Lifestyle Coach Training
- Need greater support from senior leadership to deliver DPP
- Time/staff commitment to implement DPP
- Reimbursement concerns



Virginia-Based Health Care Organizations

- Organizations interviewed have historically used the Stanford Chronic Disease Program, not the CDC NDPP
- Good spread in Virginia
- Program is free
- Sustainability difficult without partnerships or continued grant funding
- Perceived competition between programs



Payers (Health Plans)

- Challenges are competing requirements integration of technology, time, resources
- Affordable Care Act (ACA) has brought more focus on prevention
- Reimbursement could be increased with partnerships and additional data on effectiveness



Purchasers (Employers)

- Most employers interviewed were selfinsured
- Offer screening for both prediabetes and diabetes
- Provide online education/resources, discounts, health coaching and incentives
- Self-insured plans provide more intensive and engaging programs around weight management and healthy eating; provide good opportunities for DPP implementation
